ALL students admitted to the OHC will choose from the following core courses that encourage analytical thinking, ethical reasoning, scientific inquiry, and engagement with the great works of art, literature, philosophy, and history that changed the world. Students pursuing a minor will choose two courses. Students pursuing the major will take all three courses.

All honors students will undertake 3 hours of **HNRS 1010: Honors Core Experiences**. We want your honors education to extend beyond the classroom. PICK A PATHWAY

HONORS MINOR

OHC students pursuing the Honors minor will complete at least 9 additional honors hours (3 courses) from HNRS seminars, departmental honors courses, or honors option. At least 6 hours must be at the 3000 or 4000 level.

APPLY TO LASAL

Admission to the minor is at the discretion of the college. To apply, students must attend an informational meeting, complete an application, and undertake an interview in the fall semester of the freshman or sophomore year. Admission is not guaranteed.

APPLY TO TRACTS

Admission to the **Honors Traditions in Critical Thought and Scholarship (TRACTS)** major is at the discretion of the college. To apply, students must fill out the Honors TRACTS application. Admission is not guaranteed.

HONORS RESEARCH MINOR

Students pursuing the Honors Research minor have the option of completing a further 9 hours of guided research that comprises an Honors Culminating Academic Project (CAP): **HNRS 3800 CAP Reading and Research Methods** (3 hours); **HNRS 3900 CAP Development and Writing** (3 hours); **HNRS 4000 Capstone** (3 hours)

LASAL MINOR

The Louisiana Service and Leadership (LASAL) minor prepares OHC students for leadership roles in Louisiana, particularly in the fields of public service, social justice, and environmental sustainability. The LASAL minor involves students in ongoing efforts to find solutions to issues such as coastal wetlands loss and chronic poverty. OHC students completing the LASAL minor must complete the following: 1 of the following 2 courses: **HNRS 3010 Leaders and Scholarship** (3 hours); **HNRS 3100 Internships, Field Work, Off-Campus Programs** (3 hours) Plus (9 hours): **HNRS 2015 The State of Louisiana** (3 hours); **POLI 2056 Government of Louisiana** (3 hours); **HIST 3071 Louisiana History** (3 hours)

HONORS TRACTS MAJOR

The **Founding Traditions sequence**. These four courses explore themes in the Classical, Medieval, Renaissance, and Modern worlds.

Honors Advanced Seminars. Choose from an array of special topics that emphasize the interdisciplinary nature of our world, including Non-European civilizations, History of Science, Philosophy, Politics and Economics (PPE), Technology and Society, or Leaders and Scholarship.

Foreign Languages. Five semesters of one or more languages. Build on what you learned in high school or try something new.

Choose any **6 additional honors courses** from HNRS seminars, departmental honors courses, or honors option; at least 9 hours must be at the 3000/4000 level.

Approved Electives give you lots of flexibility to complete a second major or minor.

Become an expert in a discipline of your choosing. Complete 9 hours of guided research that comprises an Honors Culminating Academic Project (CAP): **HNRS 3800 CAP Reading and Research Methods** (3 hours); **HNRS 3900 CAP Development and Writing** (3 hours); **HNRS 4000 Capstone** (3 hours)
